However, it seems now almost inevitable that this Committee will be set up, and it is only its terms of reference that could be altered—which would be what the commission on Disciplinary Committee is now struggling for. Its effects on the student movement in HKU has yet to be accessed, but we certainly hope that it is not going to close the window on the ivory tower through which we have been peeping for the last few years.

DIRECT FROM THE VICE - CHAIRMAN on 3rd, 1971.

The Medic Canteen was closed down on 23rd Dec., 1970. I think that most of the medical students would like to know the reason underlying this and what has happened to our canteen. The following is an account of the essential events that took place from 11th Nov., '70 to 4th Jan, '71.

In the first Council Meeting held on 30th Nov., '70, it was discussed whether we should accept the application of a new caterer or continue the contract with the old one, Mr. Chung. It was the decision of the Council that the latter choice be preferred. Mr. Chung also declared that he was prepared to run the canteen. to run the canteen.

on 7th Dec., Mr. Chung Suddenly informed me that he had changed his mind and decided to quit the job. An emergency Council meeting was held on the next day and the application of a new caterer was accepted. The exco was also empowered to negotiate with the applicant on matters concerning the canteen. After several discussions, most of the terms were settled and the applicant promised the exco that the canteen would be reopened on 4th Jan., '71 when the second term begins, while Mr. Chung would continue running the canteen till 30th Dec.

I was informed on 22nd Dec. that the Estate and Maintenance Officer, Mr. Markey had inspected the

canteen and he was of the opinion that the place was not in good condition. He estimated that it would take estimated that it would take \$3,500 for cleaning the kitchen and recommended to the Vice-chancellor that the canteen be closed for this purpose. I had an interview with Mr. Markey and since hid did not insist upon cleaning the canteen by the university, I decided to let the out-going caterer clean up the place himself for two reasons:

1)That the estimated cost of cleaning the kitchen to be \$3,500 which would mean the confiscation of the whole deposit of the caterer. It seems more appropriate to let the canteen caterer get back his money by cleaning the canteen to the satisfaction of the maintenance the maintenance officer.

2)I am afraid that if the university undertakes this task, the canteen would be closed for too long a period which would be extremely inconvenient to each and exercised. each and every medical student concerned. Thus the canteen was closed down on 23rd Dec. and the caterer undertook the work of cleaning. Mr. Markey was asked to re-inspect the place on 30th Dec. On that day, Mr. Markey came to inspect the place and was not satisfied. He was asked to reinspect the place on the morning of 2nd Jan. In the mean time, we pressed hard on the caterer to clean every crevices and corner in the on the caterer to clean every rervices and corner in the kitchen. Dr. Langenberg, warden of the Medic Centre, came to have a look at the canteen on 1st Jan., and found it in a satisfactory condition. On 2nd Jan., we finally satisfied Mr. Markey to our great relief.

The new caterer moved in on that day for preparatory work so that the canteen could be opened on 4th Jan when the second term begins. Due to the shortage of time for preparation, only a limited number of varieties of food can be supplied on the first few days. A certain degree of confusion is also deemed inevitable. I do hope that the condition of the canteen will return to normal before long.

THE OTHER day when I emerged m the Concert Hall after thoroughly enjoyable ening - feeling once again a thoroughly enjoyable evening - feeling once again that life is worth living after all - I happened to meet a friend, who was accompanied by a beautiful girl. The natural question, it occurred to me, to ask, after a brief greeting, was 'How did you enjoy the performance?' The answer I got was a surprising one, but a truthful one, I suppose - 'Boring!' And it was no other than the magnificent performance given by the Russian prodigy pianist, Vladimir Ashkenazy, that is in question. With his brilliant rendering of Schubert's Sonata in G Major and his almost magical touches of the piano keyboard, imagine a fellow concert-goer describing such a

Surely the Concert Hall has degenerated to a lovers' meeting place of late! What else? And that is something that all serious-minded people should not encourage.
