#### I. INTRODUCTION

1. Employment destination statistics are collected annually to indicate where graduates go after they leave the University of Hong Kong. This report covers all FULL-TIME bachelor's degree graduates for the year 1998.

The medical graduates surveyed for this report received their degree in 1997 and completed internships in 1998.

- 3. Questionnaires were sent out to all graduates in November 1998, with two subsequent reminders. Checking of questionnaires and telephone-chasing took place between December and January 1999. Data validation and analysis as well as compilation of statistical tables were done in late February and March 1999. A total of 2,383 graduates replied, representing a response rate of 90%. A detailed breakdown of response rates by curriculum is in Appendix 1 on p.9.
- 4. Core statistical tables on employment situation, employment sectors, occupations and monthly income are included in this report. There are 17 other statistical tables which have not been included but are available on request. See Appendix 7 (p.27) for the titles of these statistical tables.

#### II. EMPLOYMENT SITUATION

1. An unemployment rate of 6.6% was reported, compared with the previous year's 2.3%.

2. Among those in employment, about 55% (64% in 1997) of graduates had more than one offer of appointment. On average, each graduate was able to obtain 2 job offers. By the end of September 1998, 90% were able to secure employment, compared with 92% in the previous year.

1. Commerce & industry remained the biggest employment sector (60.9%) for new graduates, followed by education (15.3%), community, social & personal services (15.3%) and civil service (8.4%).




Figure 2. Employment sectors




Figure 3. Distribution of graduates among the various employment sectors 1989-1998

#### V. REMUNERATION

- 1. On average, the basic starting salary was \$12,300 per month, down 1.6% from the previous year's \$12,500, while the gross salary was \$13,325, down 8.2% from the previous year's \$14,521. Inflation factor was -1.6%.
- 2. A closer look at the various employment sectors shows that the average basic monthly salary received by graduates working in the civil service was down 4.1%., (from \$19,860 to \$19,055 per month), while the salary for commerce & industry fell by 14% (from \$11,600 to \$10,000) and salary for community, social & personal services fell by 40.1% (from \$18,000 to \$10,655). The average monthly salary received by graduates working in the education sector had increased slightly by 0.2% (from \$19,535 to \$19,580).
- 3. The significant drop (40.1%) in salary for social & personal services was the result of underemployment. The number of graduates holding non-graduate appointments increased by 191% (from 11 to 32 graduates). The salary of these graduates is usually lower than that for graduate appointments.
- 4. While the salary for civil service and commerce & industry had not experienced a major cut down, there were several cases where graduates' income was extremely low. As for civil service, the lowest salary reported was HK\$6,000. This graduate was working as a temporary helper. As for income below HK\$5,000 in commerce & industry, these graduates were mostly employed in sales-related positions with a low basic salary plus commission.


